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CPRE LONDON'S FIVE PRIORITY AREAS FOR THE NEW LONDON PLAN

The GLA is expected to publish the new London Plan consultation on Friday 1 December 2017. This plan will be vital for the future development of London and improvement of its environment. To help make London a better place for everyone it should contain strong policies to:

1. Make much better use of wasted space including

- Re-modelling low-rise, low density retail/industrial estates for new housing and employment space.
- Regenerating suburban town centres to increase housing densities in outer London
- Reclaiming London's grey space land devoted to car-related infrastructure such as surface car parking, derelict garages, underused lanes, and roundabouts - with an ambitious target to reduce land given over to cars.
- Establishing an 'Urban Land Commission' to explore new measures to make better use of urban land and support the target to make more than half of London green space.

2. Secure the housing we need in the right places including:

- Meeting local housing need with more genuinely affordable housing rather than responding to spurious targets based on crude measures of market affordability.
- Promoting sensitive regeneration and intensification of low density housing estates in the most sustainable locations
- Prioritising housing delivery on small sites of less than 0.25ha (about the size of ten tennis courts) and intervening to speed up the implementation of planning permissions.
- Bringing empty homes and other suitable vacant buildings back into use.

3. Restrict low density, car dependent development including:

- Blocking applications which pay insufficient regard to the need to reduce car use.
- Encouraging more efficient use of land through well-designed, higher density schemes.
- Taking an integrated approach to major development sites to encourage modal shift.
- Adopting a city-region approach to controlling low density sprawl outside London.

4. Take effective action to protect London's Green Belt and Metropolitan Open Land including:

- Requiring a more rigorous approach to Green Belt reviews.
- Increasing GLA capacity to intervene in planning applications and Local Plan proposals which affect Green Belt.
- Using Compulsory Purchase Powers to support the enhancement Green Belt land.
- Maintaining an up to date and publicly available database on Green Belt and MOL.

5. Promote the protection and improvement of tranquil spaces, including:

- Reducing noise and air pollution in parks through traffic management and landscaping.
- Developing a network of quiet walking routes between tranquil places across London.
- Preventing and reducing light pollution in existing and new developments.
